DO YOU HAVE QUESTIONS ABOUT CANCER SCREENING?

Below are answers to some common questions. Don't hesitate to talk to a healthcare professional about screening.



What is cancer screening, and why is it so important?

- Cancer screening refers to tests and exams used to find cancer in people who don't have symptoms.¹ Regular screening increases the chance of finding certain cancers early — when they may be easier to treat.²
- Finding cancer early through screening may reduce deaths from breast, cervical, colorectal (cancer of the colon and rectum), and lung cancers.¹



When should I get screened for cancer?

- Screening schedules can be different for everyone because they are based on your age and personal risk factors (for example, your family history, race, or smoking history).¹ It's important to talk to a healthcare professional about what's right for you.



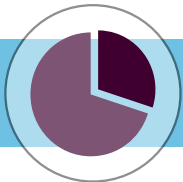
How and where can I get screened?

- If you have a doctor (or healthcare facility you visit), talk to them about which screenings you need and when and where you should schedule them.
- If you don't have a doctor, you may be able to get screened at a health center near you or a mobile screening van, with or without insurance coverage. Learn more about how to get screened and find a health center at the website address below.



Is screening affordable?

- Free or low-cost screening options may be available to you, even if you don't have insurance. Explore possible options, including government screening programs, at the website address below.
- If you do have insurance, most health plans cover preventive services such as cancer screenings.
